Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been ormitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8<sup>th</sup> of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

The State of South Carolina Anderson District

On the Fourth day of March 1833 personally appeared in open Court being the Court of Sessions and Common Pleas for said District at its Spring Term John Warnock a resident of the State and District aforesaid who being duly sworn on oath declares as follows in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7<sup>th</sup> 1832.

This Deponent was born in Ireland and came to America in 1774 being then 17 years of age – Landed in Delaware and settled in Abbeville then a part of 96 District [Ninety Six District] where he lived during the War.

He entered the service in 1775 in Captain Purvis [John Purvis'] company of Rangers. Afterwards commanded by Captain Warley [Felix Warley] – Under Colonel William Thompson [William Thomson] Enlisted for three years and having served something over twenty months was discharged on account of a broken leg which incapacitated him for service. This discharge he has lost. He served two tours against the Cherokee Indians under Colonel afterwards General Andrew Pickens in a company commanded by Captain Wilson [John Wilson]. Cannot recollect the term of Service. Some time the first a very Short time the Second.

He was afterwards captured by the Tories near Rutherford's Ford on Saluda River and remained in their custody till their defeat at the battle of Kettle Creek.<sup>1</sup> This deponent was in the battle of Stono [Stono ferry, June 20, 1779] – at the Siege of 96 [May 21 – June 19, 1781]<sup>2</sup> and in various Skirmishes, and tours of duty but cannot distinctly recollect the times or duration. Knows that he was in the service more than two years. Never had any written discharge except as before stated and knows of no person living within his reach who has any personal knowledge of his services except Peter McMahon whose attendance he has requested at the present term. He relies on his proof and his general reputation as establishing his service. He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a Pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the Pension roll of the agency of any State. John Warnock appeared personally before me and made oath in due form of Law to the following Declaration as an Amendment of his original application prepared the 4<sup>th</sup> of March 1833. He has at this time no record of his age although one was made and long preserved in a family Bible though it is most distinctly fixed in his mind that he was in the Eighteenth year of his age when he entered the Service. This was in July 1775 when he enlisted in the third Regiment of South Carolina State Troops [sic, Continental Line] as previously set forth and was discharged in May 1777 by a written discharge which was preserved until within a few years past.

In February 1779 he was captured by the Tories and made his escape from them shortly after when they were defeated at the battle of Kettle Creek.

He cannot recollect with Sufficient distinctiveness the terms of his engagement in the Cherokee service to give the time of commencement or their duration.

In March 1779 he was employed and went into the service as a Waggoner and continued with the Waggon attached principally to the command of Colonel Pickens through various parts of the State and some part of this time having his Waggon and accompanying the troops as a pack horse man until the August following.

Again on the first of March 1781 as a volunteer private under the command of Captain Wilson and Colonel Pickens he was on a tour of duty until the first of October of the same year and continually in Service.

The foregoing composed the only terms of Service he can now designate by the month and year although he has seen much more service than herein set forth. Peter McMahon was enlisted in the same Company in Thompson's Regiment and this Deponent thinks the same day that he did though from the extreme frailty of said McMahon he has not yet been able to procure his attendance for examination. His memory too is quite imperfect worse even than this Deponent's as it was principally upon the testimony of this Deponent that said McMahon has been placed on the Pension List with the full pay of a private

Peter McMahon<sup>3</sup> appeared personally before me and being duly Sworn declares on oath that he was well acquainted with John Warnock of Anderson District in the State aforesaid now applying for a Pension during the Revolutionary War. That he enlisted in the Service of the Country in the year 1775 under Captain Purvis and was in the Service principally under the Command of Colonel Thompson for the term of two years very nearly when he was discharged on the account of a broken leg said Warnock was always regarded as a good Whig. This Deponent never heard any other character of him.

[p 7: On February 10, 1845 in Anderson District South Carolina Eleanor Warnock a resident of said County and state, aged 77 years on the 3<sup>rd</sup> day of September last, made application for a widow's pension under the 1838 act stating that she is the widow of John Warnock, a revolutionary war pensioner; that she married him in Abbeville District South Carolina; that they were married by a Presbyterian minister by the name of Hale; that the marriage took place on January 31<sup>st</sup>, 1786; that her first born child was born January 29<sup>th</sup>, 1787 as is shown by the family record made by her husband; and that her husband died in Anderson District on May 8, 1842. She signed her application with her mark.]

[p 9: On February 11, 1845, Samuel R McFall gave testimony in Anderson District South Carolina that he married a daughter of John and Eleanor Warnock about 20 years ago; that he was aware of the family record and believes it to be a true record of the births of the children of John and Eleanor Warnock.

[Veteran was pensioned at the rate of \$80 per annum commencing March 4<sup>th</sup>, 1831, for service as a private for 2 years in the South Carolina Continental line. His widow was pensioned in a like amount.]
