Pension application of William P. Thomasson (Thompson) W6280 Transcribed by Will Graves Mary f25NC rev'd 3/8/17

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of South Carolina, York District

Personally appeared before me W. J. Clawson Commissioner and Equity for York District, and Magistrate ex officio, James Thomasson Senior who being duly sworn according to law deposeth and saith as follows, to wit:

He is the brother of William P. Thomasson deceased – that the said William P. Thomasson formerly resided in the State of North Carolina in Granville County, and subsequently removed to the State of South Carolina York District, where he resided until the time of his death.

He further saith that he knows of the service of the said W. P. Thomasson in the War of the Revolution, as an officer and private in said war. His first tour of service was under a Captain Jamison [John Jamieson] of North Carolina, Colonel Taylor's [Joseph Taylor's] Regiment, where he remained in service for 12 months, and upwards. The second tour of service, commenced shortly before the fall of Charleston, but does not know under whom he served in said campaign; but well recollects he was absent between three and four months. When he returned home, to procure clothing, and again left for the Army where he remained to this deponent's knowledge until after the surrender of Cornwallis. He entered the service sometime in the year 1778 and was almost constantly in service until the time above specified period deponent has often heard his brother William P. Thomasson say he was in the following battles – to wit, the battle of "Briar Creek" [March 3, 1779], Charleston [Charleston SC fell to the British on May 12, 1780], Hanging Rock [August 6, 1780], Camden [August 15-16, 1780] and Guilford [March 15, 1781]. At the last of these battles mentioned, the said W. P. Thomasson was under the command of General Green [sic, Nathanael Greene]. This deponent knows of his own knowledge, being at the American's camp shortly after the battle, and saw the said W. P. Thomasson in service.

This deponent further says that he was present at the marriage of W. P. Thomasson and Mary Reeves, the present claimant. That the said marriage took place in the fall of 1782 in the State of North Carolina. The marriage ceremony was performed by \_\_\_ Higgs Esq. of said State. The said William T. Thomasson and Mary Reeves, now Mary Thomasson, continued to live together as husband and wife, up to the time of his death which took place in the beginning of the year 1818, thinks about the last of January. Since the death of said W. P. Thomasson, Mary Thomasson his widow, has removed to the State of Georgia, where she now resides.

State of Georgia, Walker County

On this Eleventh day of June in the year 1846, personally appeared before me, Andrew L. Barry, an acting Justice of the Inferior Court, in & for said County, Mary Thomasson, a resident of the said County of Walker aged 82 years on the 31<sup>st</sup> day of December next, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth, on her oath, make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress, passed July the 7<sup>th</sup> 1838, entitled An act granting half pay and pensions to certain widows: -- That she is the widow of William P. Thomasson, who first entered the service of the Revolutionary war as a private and substitute in the stead of his father, Thomas Thomasson, about the year 1778, in a company as well as this declarant recollects commanded by Captain Jamison. After the said William P. Thomasson had served out the time for which his father was drafted, he immediately entered the service in his own place where he continued to serve, except at short intervals while on a visit to his friends by permission of his commanding officers, till the surrender of Lord Cornwallis at Yorktown. Sometime after my said husband, William P. Thomasson, commenced his services as a revolutionary soldier, he was promoted and held some office, but what office this declarant is not now able to say – but only recollects that the said William P. Thomasson then wore a hat or cap such as were usually worn by Officers, and had much to do with the provisions and military stores of the Army in the discharge of which duties some considerable writing was required to be performed by him. It may be that he was Quarter Master, but this declarant cannot be certain as to his grade. The said William P. Thomasson, my husband, resided in the State of North Carolina, Granville County when he entered & returned from the service – and the battles in which he was engaged were Briar Creek and Guilford and some others of which she has no positive or distinct recollection. This declarant has no distinct recollection of the field and staff officers under whom her aforesaid husband served, but has heard him frequently speak of being with Generals Greene, Lincoln, Taylor and Colonel Butler. She further declares that she was married to the said William P. Thomasson on the 23<sup>rd</sup> day of November in the year 1782 – and that her husband the aforesaid William P. Thomasson and, died on the 31<sup>st</sup> day of January in the year 1818 – that she was not married to him prior to his leaving the service, but the marriage took place previous to the first of January 1794, viz – at the time above stated. And this declarant further states that she has no documentary evidence in support of her claim. Sworn to and subscribed before me on the day and year above written.
