[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

On this 2nd day of May 1840 personally appeared before me the subscribing Justice of Quorum in and for the district aforesaid Jane McCool a resident of Chester district & State aforesaid aged Seventy-seven years lacking 2 months who being first duly sworn according to law doth on her oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress passed July 7th 1838 entitled an act granting half pay and pensions to certain widows that she is the widow of John McCool deceased who was an officer in the revolutionary war. She further declares that she was married to the said John McCool deceased on the 9th day of February 1785 and her husband the aforesaid John McCool departed this life on the 7th of September 1815 that she never was married to any other, and that she did not marry him prior to his leaving the service but the marriage took place previous to the first January 1794, viz., at the time above stated.

State of South Carolina York District: Robert Willson¹ [sic] one of the soldiers of the revolutionary war personally appears before me and on oath declares that he was personally acquainted with Capt. John McCool during the greater part of the revolutionary war and served under him as a private at the Battles of Rocky Mount [July 30, 1780]² and Hanging Rock [August 6, 1780]³ &c &c. He also states he was acquainted with Jane Love before she intermarried with Capt. John McCool deceased and now knows her to be the widow of Capt. John McCool deceased the same under whom he served and that he never knew any other revolutionary soldier or officer by the same name.





[Veteran's widow was pensioned at the rate of \$323.99 per annum commencing March 4th, 1836 and ending when she died on January 24, 1845. The pension benefit was calculated on the services of her husband as a Captain, Lieutenant & private in the South Carolina militia.]







Unionville 18th of March 1840

Sir.

In consequence of an application of my mother Jane McCool to the pension office at Washington City D.C. and returned to us of a letter from the Honorable James Rogers our representative and further communication of the Honorable J. L. Edwards, they concur in sending to your office for documentary evidence as mostly relied on in all cases of applicants, I make free to do so. My father Captain John McCool was a Revolutionary Captain during the whole time (or nearly) according to his own declaration often repeated to me and in my hearing. He volunteered at 16 years of age and united himself to Captain William Gaston's Company Chester District in a short time he rose to a captaincy was with General Sumter at the Hanging Rock, Blackstock's, Cowpens, Kings mountain & at the Eutaw he acted as aid-de-camp to General Green [Nathanael Greene] & was at the fall of Charleston at which time he was one of the men who guarded Governor Rutledge [John Rutledge] when he left the City, & was with General Williams on what is called the Cherokee expedition, these can all be attested to by living witnesses, but would be probably useless if satisfactory evidence can be derived from your office. When I was small or a boy I have often seen his commissions for, as well as I remember, he had more than one, and his Indents, all of which have been destroyed or mislaid so that they cannot be found. My mother is now old & in need of assistance & I hope a grateful country will look to her case. Any evidence of his commissions in your office that you can find a copy from under your hand will be gratefully received to be forwarded to General Rogers & the pension office – direct your communications to me at Pinckneyville P. O. Union district as I lived near that place – but in Chester District. Also forward me account of your charges &c and they will be duly attended to. I am Sir
