Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

Robert Russell Sen^r. 1 who was a Soldier of the Revolutionary Army & who is a credible Witness, came before me & made oath that Jacob Keslow enlisted for 18 months or 2 years in the 9th Virginia Regiment in which the witness served, & at or about the expiration of his first tour reenlisted for 3 years & died in actual service. Witness my hand & seal this 20th September 1832.

Levin Hyslop² a Revolutionary pensioner of the United States and a credible Witness, made oath before me that Jacob Keslow served out one term in the 9th Virginia Regiment & reenlisted for 3 years or for the War (the witness cannot say which) & afterwards died in actual service. Witness my hand & seal this 21st September 1832 at Accomack County.

Spencer Kellam,³ a Revolutionary pensioner of the United States & who is a man of the strictest truth & veracity, came before me & made oath that he recollects that Jacob Keslow enlisted in the 9th Virginia Regiment in the time of the Revolutionary War & went into service & never returned, & it was always understood that he died in the service. Witness my hand & seal this 22nd September 1832 at Accomack County & that he the witness was in the 11th Virginia Regiment.

This is to Certify, That it appears from a List in this Office of such Officers and Soldiers of the Virginia Continental Line, during the Revolutionary War, as settled their Accounts, and received Certificates for the balance of their Full Pay, according to an Act of Assembly, passed the November Session 1781, that a Certificate issued on the 30th day of November 1785, in the name of Jacob Keslow, as a Soldier of Infantry for £4.2.8, which Certificate appears to have been delivered to Colo. Cropper and was given for services prior to the 1st January 1782.
