## Bounty Land Warrant information relating to John Jerrell VAS1190 Transcribed by Will Graves

The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

This day personally appeared before me a Justice of the peace in & for the County of Orange [Virginia] & made oath upon the holy evangelists of Almighty God, that he John Jerrell enlisted as a private during the Revolutionary War for the Term of Three years, that he faithfully served the full term & was honorably discharged that he was promised one hundred acres of land for his services, and this affiant further declares upon oath that he has never received the said land or a warrant therefore, nor has any other person for his benefit received the same. Sworn to before me this 3<sup>rd</sup> day of April 1819

I Angus Rucker<sup>1</sup> of the County of [text too faint to discern] and make [text too faint to discern] it may Concern that John Jerrell enlisted under my command in the year 1777 in the Revolutionary War for the term of three years on State establishment, that the said Jerrell served [text too faint to discern] out faithfully & was honorably discharged and that he was entitled to one hundred acres of land which I believe he has never received. Given under my hand this 10<sup>th</sup> day of July 1819.
