Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." District Columbia Washington County: to wit

Personally appears before the subscriber, a Justice of the peace in and for the County aforesaid, General Philip Stewarts¹ and being sworn in the form of law, saith that he the said Philip Stewart was a Lieutenant in Washington's [William Washington's] Regiment of Cavalry of the Virginia line on the Continental establishment in the Army of the Revolution, and served as such to the close of the war: – and further saith that John Jordan a Citizen of Charles County Maryland, with whom the said Philip Stewart, the deponent, was well acquainted being himself a Citizen of the same County, was a Captain of Infantry of the Maryland line, and that, for the purpose of having a command on horseback, the before named John Jordan resigned his commission of Captain and accepted of that of Cornet of Lee's [Henry "Light Horse Harry" Lee's Legion, then faithfully served as such to the close of the War: – and the deponent further saith that himself and the said John Jordan embarked with many others on the 3rd day of July in the year 1783 at Charleston in South Carolina, and returned, in the same Vessel, to Fredericksburg Virginia: that the said Jordan shortly afterwards married a Daughter of Robert H Harrison, formerly Secretary to General Washington, and died within a few years of his marriage, that the widow of the said Jordan intermarried with David Eaton and is now a resident of the City of Washington in the County and district aforesaid. Further your Deponent saith not. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal this 26 day of May 1829
