The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

I do certify that Edward Hannah was enlisted in Washington's [probably William Washington 's] Company in April 1776 & continued in the 4th Regiment until he was captured at Charleston [May 12, 1780]; & he deposeth that he was impressed by the British & remained on board the Sandwich Armed Ship in which he was conveyed to St. Eustatia [St. Eustatius] & Antigua & that he deserted from the said Ship & got to Martinique & there he entered on board the French ship of war the Sovereign and was in the Chesapeake on board the said Ship at the taking of Lord Cornwallis [October 19, 1781] at York, that he could not prevail on the French Captain to let him return to his Regiment & he was compelled to return to the West Indies in the Fleet & that he was on board the said Ship of War when the Count de Grasse was taken & could not obtain permission to [word too faint to discern] her until the peace, the first part is known to me & the latter sworn to before me.
