Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' or 'undeciphered' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention. Researchers should not rely solely on the transcripts but should review the originals for themselves. These transcripts are intended as an aid to research, not to be used in lieu thereof.]

I do Certify upon oath that William Parish [sic] a pilot in the Revolutionary War taken by the Enemy & put on parole but before Exchanged or released died in this place four days after he returned home – Given under my hand & seal this the 29th of October 1831

Your petitioners Sarah Skinner & others respectfully states. –

That their Grandfather William Parrish was a Pilot of the Virginia State Navy in time of the revolution, That he was taken a prisoner & finally put on parole, but died a few days after he returned home. –

His representatives never received any land Bounty & pray that it may now be allowed them.

I do Certify that William Parish [sic] a Pilot was in the Navy in time of the Revolution. I was young but knew of his services. He was my father and put on parole about the year 1781 – he reached home on parole; but died a few days thereafter in service –
