## Bounty Land Warrant information relating to Frederick Heimberger VAS1477 vsl 2 Transcribed by Will Graves 3/10/14

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of Pennsylvania County of Philadelphia

On this 18<sup>th</sup> day of April A.D. 1838 personally appeared before me an Alderman and Justice of the peace in and for said County and state aforesaid, Christian Hubbert a Resident of the Northern Liberties, County aforesaid aged Eighty years who being duly sworn according to law doth depose and say that he was personally acquainted with Frederick Heimberger who was a Surgeon during the War of the Revolution, and served in the Virginia State Line, the number of the Regiment to which he the said Surgeon Frederick Heimberger was attached the Deponent is at this time unable to state, and further states that he the said Surgeon Frederick Heimberger died in Philadelphia in the year 1806.

State of Pennsylvania City of Philadelphia

On this [too faint to discern] day of January A.D. 1839 personally appeared before me an Alderman and Justice of the peace in and for the said City and State aforesaid Jacob Stremback resident of the above named City aged Eighty-four years, who being duly sworn according to law doth depose and say that he was personally acquainted with Frederick Heimberger who was a Surgeon in the Eighth Virginia Regiment during the Revolutionary War and served until about the close of the War. After Peace was declared he commenced the drug business on 2<sup>nd</sup> near Vine Streets and lived there until his death.

The Memorial of the Heirs of Frederick Heimberger to the Honorable the Executive of the State of Virginia Respectfully Sheweth . That Frederick Heimberger was appointed Surgeon of the 8 Regiment of the Virginia Line in the year 1777 and continued in the service until the termination of the War and they have understood the said Frederick Heimberger and others to say that he had never received the Bounty Land which he was entitled to for his services during the Revolutionary War. They further state that the said Frederick Heimberger has but 58 years, one daughter Maria Wilstach wife of Ganet B. Wilstach and for Grandchildren Elizabeth Gilbert wife of John R Gilbert, Elizabeth D Heimberger, Ann Maria Heimberger and Washington Heimberger all of Philadelphia Pennsylvania. Your memorialist therefore respectfully request the Executive of the State of Virginia to direct the Register of the land office to issue a warrant for the quantity of land to which they are entitled and delivered the same to their attorney in fact Joshua J Moore. For evidence of Surgeon Heimberger's services and the particulars thereof and the quantity of Land granted your Memorialists beg leave to refer to the Records of the General Government and the papers filed in the Public Office at Richmond.
