Bounty Land Warrant information relating to Richard Heywood VAS1509 Transcribed by Will Graves

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

The foregoing is hereby extracted from an Order in the Naval Journal.

This day personally appeared before me a Justice of the Peace in and for the said County Jacob Jenkins an Old and Respectable witness who after being duly sworn made the following statement. That he was well and intimately acquainted with Armourer Richard Haywood [sic] who was attached to the Navy of the Revolutionary War on board the *Henry* Galley, the said Haywood served on board of her until she was run up in Queens Creek on York River and dismantled and then was transferred to the Brig *Northampton* and there remained until 1781 the said Haywood must have served between four and five years or more.

County of Gloucester State of Virginia

This day personally appeared before me a Justice of the Peace in and for the said County and Old and Respectable witness Howard Hobdy [Howard Hobday?] who after being duly sworn made the following statement to wit, That he was well and intimately acquainted with Armourer Richard Haywood who was on board the *Henry* galley attached to the Navy of the revolutionary war and that he served in the service of the Navy upwards of three years.
