## Bounty Land Warrant information relating to John Hopper VAS1605 Transcribed by Will Graves

Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

John Hopper late a matross of Captain Baytop's Company in the first Regiment of Artillery commanded by Colonel Charles Harrison having served the Term for which he stood engaged is hereby discharged the service of the United States is good behavior as a Soldier entitles him to the respect and esteem of all his Countrymen. Given under my hand at the Park of artillery near Morristown this 10<sup>th</sup> day of June [? could be January] 1780

I do certify that the above named Soldier served the Term of 3 Years S/ Samuel K Bradford Captain artillery & Aid [A Copy]
