[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

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I do with the Advice of the Council of State hereby Certify that Margery Grotin widow of a Soldier who died in the Service of this Commonwealth during the late War, is placed on the list of Pensioners with the Annual Allowance of Twelve Pounds per annum Commencing the 1st day of January next Agreeably to an Act of the Present General Assembly

Given under my hand as Governor at Richmond this 28th day of December 1792

Las with the advice of the council of state; herely cortify that steargery frotien widow of a doldier in the Virginia line and die in the service of this formmone call decrease the late war, is put on the list of lens works with an allowance of twelve pounds per assurem bornmening the first day of January next agreeably to an act of the present General Ofsembly.

Given under my hand as Governor of the forum onwealth of Virginia at Aishmond their 28 th day of December 1792.

Margary Grotin placed on the Pension List with an allowance of £12 per annum commencing 1ssst January 1793 by act of the Present Session – Certificate issued to Mr. Wise [John Wise] member for Accomack – Duplicate to be made out by Captain Coleman & lodged in the Auditors Office

At a court held in Accomack January 27, 1794

Ordered that it be certified to the Executive that Margery Grotin and Agnes Hogskin are proper objects to be continued upon the Pension List

Levin Hyslop¹ a Revolutionary Pensioner & a man of truth & veracity made oath before me that he served in the Virginia Continental line to the end of the Revolutionary War, & has drawn 200 acres of land for his services – that John Groten enlisted in the 9th Virginia Regiment with the witness & after serving out one tour reenlisted to serve during the war & afterwards died in service. Witness my hand & seal at Accomack County July 7th, 1833.

Levern Scott² a Revolutionary Pensioner and a man of truth & veracity made oath before me that he served a tour of two years in Tho. Snead's [Thomas Snead's] Company of the 9th Virginia Continental Regiment & was discharged at camp Valley Forge in Pennsylvania – that John Groten served the same tour in the same Regiment & then reenlisted either for three years or for the war & never returned to Accomack County but (as was said) died in the service & that he the said witness returned home at the expiration of his first tour.

Witness my hand & seal this 7th July 1833 at the County of Accomack.

Robert Russell Senior³ who is a man of truth & veracity made oath before me that he enlisted in the 9th Virginia Regiment Continental line in the revolutionary War – was captured at Germantown [October 4, 1777] & served (including his imprisonment) three years & a half – & that John Groten served one tour of 18 months or 2 years in said Regiment & then reenlisted for the War & died in service as witness my hand & seal at Accomack County this 7th February 1833 S/Wm R. Custis, JP

This is to Certify, That it appears from a List in this Office of such Officers and Soldiers of the Virginia Continental Line, during the Revolutionary War, as settled their Accounts, and

received Certificates for the balance of their Full Pay, according to an Act of Assembly, passed the November Session 1781, that a Certificate issued on the 20th day of April 1785, in the name of John Grotton [sic], as a Sold. Inf. for £2.17.4, which Certificate appears to have been delivered to Colonel Cropper and was given for services prior to the 1st January 1782.
