The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

To the Honorable the Speaker & Members of the house of Delegates the petition of William Mountjoy humbly sheweth

That your petitioner engaged in the service in the 3rd Virginia Regiment in February 1774 as a Subaltern Officer. In the course of the same year he exchanged his commission for that of Quarter Master in the same Regiment. After having acted for some time first as a Regimental & afterwards as a Brigade Quarter Master, he was appointed Pay Master to the 3rd Virginia Regiment in which character he continued to serve till sometime in the spring of 1779 when he retired from the service. Your petitioner begs leave to observe that while he continued in the service though he was in the staff department, so far from shunning the duties of the field he ever sought them in the character of a volunteer. Your petitioner prays that though the letter of the law does not comprehend his case it may be taken into consideration by the Honorable General Assembly and as he has served more than three years, such proportion of land may be granted him as is by law allowed to commissioned Officers of the same rank who have served the same length of time. And your petitioner as in duty bound shall ever pray &c
