## Petition relating to James Bradley VAS1889 Transcribed by Will Graves

Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

I hereby certify that Captain James Bradley was appointed to be an officer in the State Artillery in the year 1777 and that he Served upwards of three years in that Regiment, nearly the whole of that time (if not greater) as a Captain.

To the Honourable the General Assembly of Virginia

The Petition of Ann Brough respectfully sets forth that she is one of the heirs of James Bradley deceased who was a Capt. of the Regiment of State Artillery during the Revolutionary War under the command of Col. Thomas Marshall. The said James Bradley continued in the service and was a Supernumerary Officer at the close of the War as will more fully appear from

the documents already in possession of your Hon. Body and others which will be submitted with this petition.

The said Bradley died in the Borough of Norfolk, intestate and without issue, having as his next of kin a Sister of the whole blood, a Sister and two brothers of the half blood, all of whom are since dead. Your Petitioner is the daughter of his sister of the half blood; she is a widow, advanced in life and in humble circumstances and she appeals with respect full confidence to your Honourable Body, to pass a Law, as in other cases has been done, authorizing the Auditor of Public Accounts to settle with, and paid to the heirs of the said James Bradley his commutation of five years full pay in lieu of half pay for life as a Capt. in the state Artillery as aforesaid.
