## [From bounty land records in the Library of Virginia]

By the Books in this office it appears that a Mily [Military] Land bounty warrant issued to William Pique for his services as a Sergeant State line who served to the end of the war. No Mily warrant appears to have issued in the name of William Pike or other person for services performed in the Revolutionary war by William Pike.

State of Virginia City of Richmond to wit

This day William Pike came before me a Justice of the peace for the said City and made oath that he entered under Captain Edward Stubblefield of the 10<sup>th</sup> Virginia Regiment [several indecipherably faint words] in the month of January 1780 to serve for that he War, that he was soon after made Sergeant [several indecipherably faint words] at which time he was honorably dismissed – but did not receive a regular discharge –

Given under my hand this 22<sup>nd</sup> day of May 1821

State of Virginia Henrico County, to wit: – This day William Pike came before me, William Price, a Justice of the Peace for the aforesaid County and made oath that he enlisted under Captain Edward Stubblefield in 10<sup>th</sup> Virginia Regiment January 1780 and that he served as a Sergeant to the end of the War, at which time he was honorably dismissed. Given under my hand this 22<sup>nd</sup> day of May 1821
