Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of Virginia Campbell County to wit:

I John Willard¹ do hereby certify that I have a distinct recollection of Jasper Pillow in the Revolutionary War, and know the fact that he enlisted in 1777 under Captain John Morton of P. Edward [Prince Edward County] for three years and was attached to the 4th Virginia Regiment on Continental establishment for I was with him in the Northern Army. The said Regiment was commanded by Colonel Lawson and General Stevens – I was with him two years and have every reason to believe that he continued in the service as much as three years – and have heard from the most respectable source that he was afterwards in the southern Army. I am in the 79th year of my age and am a soldier of the Continental line and now a Pensioner of the United States.
