Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." This day, Nathan Pope, personally appeared before me, Robert Goodwin, a Justice of the Peace in & for the County aforesaid, and stated on oath, that he is now in the 67th year of his age, that his brother Thomas Pope, after serving several short tours of duty, in the beginning of the War of the Revolution, enlisted in the Virginia line on Continental establishment about the year 1778 or 1779, first for 18 months, and before that time was out, he reenlisted for and during the War, and so continued to serve until peace was proclaimed, making in the whole term, more than 3 years – That for some years before his death the said Thomas Pope received a pension for his Revolutionary services from the United States – His heirs are his 2 children, Phereby [Phebe?] wife of John Cooperm and Elizabeth Roe, widow of John Roe deceased –
