
## Southern Campaign American Revolution Pension Statements and Rosters

Virginia documents pertaining to Lawrence Beddoe VAS2451 Transcribed and annotated by C. Leon Harris.

[The following are from bounty-land records in the Library of Virginia.]

The affidavit of Thomas Sandey [Thomas Sandy VAS2452] and Alleck Saunders [VAS2453] the former Aged about fifty and the latter Aged about fifty three years – Citizens of the Commonwealth of virginia and residents of Richmond and Westmoreland Counties in the said Commonwealth of Virginia – Taken this day at Westmoreland Court House, before us the subscribers Justices of the peace in and for the said County of Westmoreland in the Common Wealth Aforesaid. The said Affiants being first sworn according to law say they have been well acquainted with Laurence Beddoe, ever since the 28th day of February in the year 1778 at which time or nearly about which time he the said Laurence Beddoe, enlisted as a soldier under John Mazerett [R16059], Capt. of Artillery in a Company Raised in the lower counties of the northern neck, of Virginia, And Continued in the service in the state of Virginia as a soldier in the Revolutionary war, between Great Brittain and America for three years at least. And that he was never out of the service as a soldier from the time of Inlistment till his discharge. That the said Laurance Beddoe is and always has been a Citizen of the state of Virginia and was born in the County of King George and now resides in Richmond County aforesaid. That about 26th or 28th of February 1781 the said Laurance Beddoe obtained his discharge from the service aforesaid from Capt Christopher Roan [sic: Christopher Roane X635] at the citty of Richmond.

Taken, sworn to, and signed before us Justices of the peace } Sam'l Templeman for the County of Westmoreland this 30<sup>th</sup> day May 1812. } George Glascock

Laurence Beddoe this day Came before us Justices of the Commonwealth of Virginia in the County aforesaid and made Oath that he never Received any Land for his services as a soldier, that he has either lost or mislaid his discharge, and that he knows of no officer (now living) under whome he served – given under our hands this 30 May 1812.
