From pension records in the Library of Virginia:

I do Certify that Thomas Brown was taken a prisoner at the Battle of Germantown [4 Oct 1777] and got frost bitten in the New Jail in Philadelphia Given under my hand this 7th day of may 1789

on Examination of Thomas Brown who appears to be about thirty five years of age find his left leg very greatly enlarged with an Oedematous swelling & several [illegible word] now open, & which tho' not deep, discharge considerably; their present appearance seem to me to be the result of a general Ill habit of Body: from what cause this has arisen, he must account, but there is no doubt that he is considerably disabled from obtaining a support by hard Labour only.

I do with the advice of Council hereby certify, that Thomas Brown, who was a private in the Ninth Virginia Regiment and disabled in the service of the United States is continued a Pensioner with an allowance of Twelve pounds yearly from the first day of January One thousand seven hundred and eighty six.

Given under my hand as governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia at Richmond this eighth day of September in the year 1789.

On the motion of Thos. Brown, ordered that the Sheriff of this County pay him Twelve Pounds for his pention for the year 1786. agreeable to the Governors Certificate Wm. Miller D.C

NOTE: "J Payne" appears to have been Joseph Payne, pension application W18693. Payne, and presumably Brown, was in the company of Capt. Samuel Woodson, which was raised in Goochland County VA.
