Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." John Barber came before George Garner one of the Commonwealth Justices of the Peace for said County and made oath that had Isaac Proctor was a Prisoner in Charles Town in South Carolina part of the years 1780 & '81.

Given under my hand & seal this 25 day of April 1794 S/George Garner

I hereby certify that Isaac Proctor enlisted with me in the first week of December 1776 as a private in the 15<sup>th</sup> Virginia Continental Regiment & that the said Proctor enlisted for a term of the War, he continued in that Regiment until I left it in July 1778, & I do believe he is the same Proctor mentioned in a Certificate on the other side, the said 15<sup>th</sup> Regiment having been captured (that is the remains of it) in Charlestown in the year 1780.

Be it known that Before me Robert Bailey A Justice of the [Peace] in and for said county personally Appeared Job Self aged 68 years and made oath in due form of law that he was well acquainted with Isaac Proctor and knows that he Enlisted for and during the Revolutionary War and was taken prisoner by the British and after the close of the war the said proctor Returned home to his [several undeciphered words] and was unable to [four undeciphered words] for himself. In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand this 6 may 1831 [illegible signature]
