It appears by the Books of this Office that on the 9th of March 1793, a warrant for 400 acres issued to William Higginbothem, in consideration of his services for the war as a Sergeant on the Continental line. And also a warrant issued to William Higginbotham February 28th 1810 455 acres for his services as a Sergeant for 10 months more than 6 years. Land Office

I do hereby Certify that I knew William Higginbotham as a Lieutenant in the late Revolutionary War with Great Britain. He entered into Service in the year 1776 & continued on service 3 years & 6 months in the Virginia Line on Continental Establishment & in the 17th Regiment given under my hand this 19th of July 1811
