Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

I do with the advice of Council hereby certify, that Faith Orr widow of William Orr who was a private in Buford's detachment and died in the service of the United States is entitled to the sum of six pounds yearly; which allowance is to commence from the first day of January 1787

Given under my hand as Governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia, at Richmond, this  $16^{th}$  day of April 1787.

I do with the advice of Council hereby certify that Faith Orr Widow of William Orr, who was a Soldier in Colonel Buford's Detachment and died in the service of the United States, is continued on the list of Pensioners with an allowance of 6 pounds yearly commencing the first day of January 17 90. Given under my hand as Lieutenant Governor (in the absence of the Governor) at Richmond this 16<sup>th</sup> day of April 1793.
