

Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]



The Sertificates Received Abenezar Osburn the first of 1777 Continued 124 Days the Next from the February the 10 in 1779 until May the 19 in the year 1779 Volenteen'd under the Command general Clerk [probably George Rogers Clark] on ten Mile Crick [Ten Mile Creek] and Discharg'd at Kuskuskee [Kaskaskia] Town Mossiess [? Mississippi?] And Fifty three Days on the Road home

I do here By Sertify that Abeneza orsburn Sarved as a Solder in my Company [illegible] of Volenters at grave Creek one hundred twenty four Days given under my hand June [illegible] 1777



is to certify that Ebenezar Osburn Sar'd as a Soldier in my my from [illegible] February till the date hereof [illegible]



I Certify that Ebenezer Osborn a Soldier in my Company Served his time of Enlistment as a true and faithful Soldier and is now discharged. May 19th 1779

State of Ohio Clermont County: SS Be it remembered that on this 19th day of September 1811 Ebenezer Osborn personally came before the undersigned two of the Justices of the peace in and for the County aforesaid and being duly sworn according to law deposeth and saith that he is the same Ebenezer Osborn mentioned in the two certificates hereunto annexed which are signed Wim Harrod Captain and the certificate of John Williams & G. R. Clark which is also here with annexed and that all the pay he ever received for the services in said Certificates mentioned was to quarts of Taffie and a handkerchief the whole being rated \$3 & further this deponent saith not. S/ Ebenezer Osborne
