Bounty Land Warrant information relating to Richard Neale VAS369 Transcribed by Will Graves

Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of Virginia, Monroe County to wit

This day Captain James Jones ¹ a revolutionary soldier personally appeared before the subscriber a Justice of the Peace in and for the County of Monroe aforesaid (Henley Chapman Esquire the attorney for the Commonwealth being present) and made oath in due form of law that he was well acquainted with Richard Neale in the War of the Revolution, that said Neal was a regular soldier in Captain Thomas Drews [Thomas Drew's] company and under the command of Colonel Charles Porterfield who was killed at the battle of General Gates in South Carolina and that he always understood and believed that said Richard Neale served during the whole of the revolutionary War that he became acquainted with said Neal in the Army and believes he was as brave a soldier as ever faced an enemy and was esteemed as such by all who knew him. Given under my hand & seal this 19th day of November 1835.
