Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of North [Carolina] Buncombe County: This 8th day of January 1823 came Martin Maney before me Zebulon Baird Esquire one of the Justices of the peace for said County Martin Maney who being sworn according to law deposeth & saith That he enlisted in the Continental Army Virginia line at the Big Island of Holstein [Holston River] under John Steet [?]¹ Ensign in the company of Captain Overton in the 9th Virginia Regiment about the last of the year 1776 for the term of 3 years & that he served his full time out and was honorably discharged at the Valley Forge in the State of Pennsylvania by General Muhlenberg that he lost his discharge during the same war in an expedition against the Cherokee Indians somewhere on the French Broad River that he knows not of one of the old soldiers remaining who served with him or of any other means to prove his services by but his own oath.
