Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

Louisa County to wit

This day Thornton Mead, personally appeared before me, one of the Commonwealth's Justices of the Peace for said County and made oath that he went down to the Siege of York as a militia man and there enlisted in the Virginia line for Continental service, under Lieutenant Garland Cosby for a term, during the Revolutionary War, in the year 1781 in the month of September or October – that he knew was to have two hundred acres of land & forty dollars bounty, and was ordered to keep in readiness at a moment's warning, but was never called for as the war soon after terminated. Given under my hand this 8th day of February 1831

Louisa County to wit

This day William Dickinson personally appeared before me a Justice of the peace for the County aforesaid & made oath to the facts contained in the above certificate. Given under my hand the day & date as expressed above.

Louisa Court-House 14th of November 1831

I do hereby certify that I am well acquainted with William Dickinson the with then affiant and that he is a man of respectability and worthy of credit.

The claim of Thornton Mead is submitted on the affidavit of the old gentleman himself who is yet alive and very poor, and that of William Dickinson. The respectability of William Dickinson is sustained by the certificate of N. J. Poindexter the representative of Louisa – Mr. Mead having enlisted for the war will be entitled to 200 acres.

The certificate of Mr. Poindexter is in my handwriting it was at his request when he signed it he expressed his willingness to sign one in much stronger terms.
