Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

I do Certify that Edmon Feare [sic] a Soldier in Colonel Guests Detachment of the Virginia Line has served the full term for which he was Enlisted and received his Discharge from Major Stephenson, that he has received his pay in Continental Currency up to the last day of November 1779, since which he has only received \$2 in Specie from the Dty Comsy [Deputy Commissary] Genl of Prisoners at Chs town [Charleston] (his Discharge was given at Williamsburg the 25th day of July 1781.

NB Major Stephenson was the Senior Officer present of the V.L.

I do Certify Edmond Fears enlisted himself a regular Soldier sometime in August 1777 – to serve three years which time he faithfully served and is entitled to his proportion of Land.
