Bounty Land Warrant information relating to Robert Miller VAS682 Transcribed by Will Graves

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[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." I James Soyers¹ of the County of Pittsylvania and State of Virginia do hereby certify and solemnly swear that Robert Miller who died some years ago in the County of Halifax in the State aforesaid was a Continental Soldier in the Army of the Revolution in Captain Thomas Howard's [Thomas Hoard's] Company; that he was with me in the said Army when Blueford [Abraham Buford] was defeated [May 29, 1780] in South Carolina at a place called the hanging Rock, that he was severely wounded in that engagement and taken a prisoner by the British. I was also taken a prisoner at the same time and severely wounded we were examined by the surgeon of the British Army and pronounced by him to be unfit for Service, in the consequence of the wounds received both of us were paroled, Given under my hand this 22nd day of November 1832
