## Bounty Land Warrant information relating to Dunford Moore VAS726 Transcribed by Will Graves vsl 4VA 6/27/13

I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

I do hereby Certify that (I Joshua Singleton an officer in the Virginia State Navy during the Revolutionary War) that Dunford Moore Seaman was in Service in the Galley *Henry*<sup>1</sup> (Captain Tompkins) whilst I was attached to that Galley & when I was turned over to the Ship *Dragon* I left him in Service – Dunford Moore was an able bodied man and excellent Seaman, I frequently met with him after the close of the War & from tradition I will say I believe he was faithful to the end, and as fully deserves the gratitude of his Country as any man under Navy Orders

Gloucester County State of Virginia Personally appeared before me Henry J Neville [?], a Justice of the Peace for the County aforesaid Joshua Singleton and made oath to the above Certificate. Given under my hand & seal this 9<sup>th</sup> day of Novr. [?] 1833
