Bounty Land Warrant information relating to Nicholas Lackhouse VAS810 vsl 6VA Transcribed by Will Graves 8/11/13

I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." State of Illinois Monroe County

I, David Nowlin Clerk of the Circuit Court of said County, do certify that it is proven in open court, to the satisfaction of said Court, that the within named Nicholas Lackhouse was a Private in the revolutionary War in the Illinois Regiment commanded by Colonel George Rogers Clark, that he served until the Regiment was discharged and that he never received a warrant for the Bounty Land promised him, neither on the part of the United States or the State of Virginia, nor did he ever transferred his claim to it in any manner whatsoever. It is further proven that the said Nicholas Lackhouse died intestate and that the within named parties to this instrument are the only Heirs.

[Power of attorney executed in St. Clair County Illinois September 10, 1834 by Antoine Boisseau and Julie Boisseau, his wife, (late Jubilee Lackhouse, heirs at law of Nicholas Lackhouse) in powering their attorney to seek the land due them as heirs of Nicholas Lackhouse.]
