Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." These certify that Matthew Lattimore enlisted as a Soldier in my Company of Regulars in the Ninth Virginia Regiment the twenty eighth of February A.D. 1776. His enlistment was for two years which I believe he faithfully served. I believe likewise from good information that he reenlisted for the space of three years and afterwards during the War and that he was killed in the Service at Charleston at the time of the Siege [Charleston surrendered May 12, 1780]

by me this 18th of August A.D. 1783 S/ John Hays late Major in the Continental Army
