[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of Virginia Charlotte County to wit:

This day Colonel William Morton came before me a justice of the peace for the County aforesaid & made oath, that he knew James Lawson formerly of said County from the time he was a Boy – That he understood he entered into the regular service & that he was killed in the Battle of the Eutaw Springs [September 8, 1781] – That he wants saw him in uniform dress during the war on furlough – & that he has not heard of him since; from which he concludes, he was killed as aforesaid – That he knew of no other James Lawson of the said County of Charlotte – and further that Benjamin Lawson of the said County of Charlotte is one of the Brothers of the said James Lawson.
