I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

I do hereby Certify, that William Lewis, deceased, Brother of Francis Lewis, was a Lieutenant in the first Virginia Regiment on Continental Establishment in the September 1775 and I believe held the rank of Major at the close of the late War.
