## Bounty Land Warrant information relating to Zadock Bailey VAS931 Transcribed by Will Graves

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

## [From bounty land records in the Library of Virginia]

These are to certify that the bearer hereof Zadock Bailey a soldier in the first Virginia Regiment having faithfully served the United States from the 15 May 1781 to this date, and being enlisted for the war is hereby discharged from the American Army. Given at the war office the 6<sup>th</sup> July 1783. By order of the Secretary of War S/ Benjamin Lincoln S/ Jos. Carleton, Secry.

The within certificate shall not avail the bearer as a discharge, until the ratification of the Definitive treaty of peace: previous to which time, and until proclamation thereof shall be made, he is to be considered as being on furlough.

John Pinney [?]--deceased enlisted about the same time and served 3 years.

Isma Bayly [Isma? Bailey] Sergeant enlisted about the same time and served 3 years.

John Hart deceased enlisted the last of 1775, or beginning of 1776 and served to the end of the war.

Thomas Bennet [Thomas Bennett] deceased enlisted about the same time and served to the end of the war.

John Delastalius deceased enlisted about the same time, and served to the end of the war.

James Cropper<sup>2</sup> enlisted about the same time, and served to the end of the war.

Zerebabel Harman deceased enlisted about the same time, and served 3 years.

Caleb Broadwater deceased enlisted about same time and served 3 years, since deceased.

Jedediah White deceased enlisted about the same time, and served 3 years.

Thomas Bagwell Sergeant enlisted about the same time, and served 3 years.

Thomas lingo deceased enlisted the last of the year 1775, or beginning of 1776, and served to the end of the war.

Thomas Parker of Accomack County into the Army of the revolutionary war, the latter end of the year 1775, or beginning of the year 1776, as a Lieutenant and was afterwards a Captain; he served with reputation as an officer to the end of said war.
