Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

Philip Lockhart being duly sworn says that he has never received from the State of Virginia nor from the United States any land bounty on account of services rendered by his brother Walter Lockhart who was a soldier of the 6th Regiment of the Virginia Continental line, neither did the said Walter Lockhart ever receive the said bounty land during his lifetime or in any way dispose of it so far as this deponent knows or believes, neither has this deponent ever received it or in any way disposed of his claim to it neither has any other person ever received the said bounty land so far as this deponent knows or believes.

Daniel Tyler¹ aged about seventy-one years being first duly sworn says that Walter Lockhart enlisted in Amherst County in State of Virginia in the year 1776 for during the war and served in a Company commanded by Captain Samuel J Cabell in the sixth Regiment commanded by Colonel Buckner [Mordecai Buckner], in the Virginia Continental line, in which Regiment and Company the said Lockhart continued to serve faithfully until the winter of the same year in which he enlisted, at which time he died at a place called Gwinn's Island² and was buried on the said Island. This deponent was a messmate of the said Lockhart's, was with him when he died and assisted in his burial.

² Although the deponent does not say so, it is possible that the veteran died at the engagement on Gwinn's Island on July 8-10, 1776 when forces under the command of John Murray, Lord Dunmore, the last Royal Governor of Virginia, fought forces of the Whigs. Dunmore was driven from the state shortly thereafter.
