## Pension application of Philip Mallary BLWt1502-300 Transcribed by Will Graves

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

Note: This file contains no official documentation other than a form letter in response to a request for information in which the following statement appears:

The Revolutionary War records of this office show that Warrant No. 1502, for 300 acres of bounty land, was issued August 25, 1789, on account of the services of Philip Mallary, Captain, Virginia Line.

This office has no record of settlements made in the application for bounty land because of the disruption of papers in such a early applications, when the War Office was burned in 1800, therefore, no further data relative to that officer [exists].





I do hereby Certify that Philip Mallory Esquire of Fauquier County was appointed a Luit. [Lieutenant] in the 15<sup>th</sup> Virginia Regiment on Continental Establishment on the first of December 1776 & that he served until the peace took place which was in November 1783. Given under my hand this 6<sup>th</sup> day of July 1807.

This is to Certify, That it appears from a List in this Office of such Officers and Soldiers of the Virginia Continental Line, during the Revolutionary War, as settled their Accounts, and received Certificates for the balance of their Full Pay, according to an Act of Assembly, passed the November Session 1781, that a Certificate issued on the 15<sup>th</sup> day of February 1782, in the name of Philip Mallory, as a Captain infantry for £360, which Certificate appears to have been delivered to himself and was given for services prior to the 1<sup>st</sup> January 1782.

To wit for pay as Lieutenant from 1 January 77 to 14<sup>th</sup> May 1779 and as Captain from 14<sup>th</sup> May 79 to 31<sup>st</sup> December 1781.

Captain Philip Mallory has been settled with in full as a Captain in the Virginia line, including

his commutation of 5 years full pay in lieu of Half Pay for life.

## Richmond 25th June 1809

## Dear Captain

I was favored with your Letter of the \_\_ Instant a few days ago by it, I am greatly hurt to find you never received my answer to your letter of the last winter; which I put into the Post Office with my own hand, directed in the manner you wished – it gives me much concern that you should have been so long under an impression that I was inattentive to the application of an old and much esteemed fellow soldier. When I last wrote, it was to inform you, that all the Interest of the funds of the Society have been appropriated, but that [paper damaged and several words is illegible] money you should again hear from me.

Since the receipt of your last letter, the Agents of the Society have been consulted, and they feel great regret that they are not able to make you and advance of more than \$50 at present – hearing that General Marshall sets off in a few days for your neighborhood, we shall request the favor of him to be the bearer of it. I feel considerable pain & difficulty in using my pen having had the misfortune in the last year to have my right arm broken and my elbow and shoulder dislocated with sentiments of real respect esteem & friendship I remain
