## Pension application of Benjamin Moseley BLWt1932-200 Transcribed by Will Graves

Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

## Virginia

At a court held in the County of Amelia at the Courthouse thereof on Thursday 28<sup>th</sup> day of February 1833

Satisfactory evidence was this day produced in court to prove that Mary Watkins and Ann B. Jones are the children of Benjamin Moseley deceased and that Eppes Branch, Ann Jones (late Ann Branch), Francis Branch, Benjamin Branch, Eliza Branch, Sarah branch are all and the only children of Eliza Branch deceased formerly Eliza Moseley who was a child of said Benjamin Moseley – And that the said Mary Watkins, Ann B. Jones and Eliza Branch were the only children and heirs of the said Benjamin Moseley deceased.

## State of Virginia County of Powhatan

I Mary Watkins heir at law of Benjamin Moseley do, upon oath, testify and declare, to the best of my knowledge and belief, that Benjamin Moseley did entered the service in 17\_\_\_, for the term of during the war and served as a Lieutenant in the Regiment No. \_\_\_ under the command of Colonel \_\_\_\_, of the Artillery line; and that he continued in the service aforesaid until the siege of York.

I further declare, that I have never received a warrant for the bounty land promised to Benjamin Moseley on the part of the United States; nor do I believe that he ever received it, or transferred his claim to it in any manner whatsoever: therefore,

I hereby certify that Benjamin Moseley served in the Revolutionary war & I knew him at the Battle of Brandywine [September 11, 1777] & from that time until I was detached to the South and made Prisoner I knew no more of him till after Siege of York we were well acquainted after that a long time as liv'd and I have Every Reason to believe that he Served to the end of the war, But my being Prisoner with the British I have not the Chans [?] of any other Personal knowledge – I think he served in Woodford's Brigade [William Woodford].
