Bounty Land Warrant of Dennis Campbell BLWt66-100 Transcribed and annotated by C. Leon Harris

Jefferson County Jany th day 1802

Dr Sir) I am Informed My friends that you are our Representative for our District. I Now have Come forward to make my Suplication to you and Do pray you to Exaime into my Claim as to a Soldier in the [blank] Regiment of Virginia Line for my Services as a Soldier During the last war which is as I am Informed one Hundred acres of Land for All Soldiers who Served To that period I have send my Power of attorny To you Impowring you to Reserve for me what is allowed by a Late act of Congress to all During war men, also I have had the County Seal afixed to the power of attorney, to Impower you to Serve me and Ever Shall esteem your Ob[edge of page]

Chas Town [Charlestown] th of Jan'y. 1802

Denis Campble

Know all men by these presents that I Dennis Campbell of the County of Jefferson & State of Virginia do hereby constitute & appoint John Smith Esq'r. Member of Congress from this State of the County of Frederick my true & lawful attorney for me & my behalf to receive of the United States my patent of Land for my services in the fourth Regiment of the Virginia Line, hereby authorising & confirming all that my said Attorney may do in this behalf as if I were personally present & acting in my own proper person. Given under my hand & seal this 12<sup>th</sup> day of January 1802 Denis hisXmark Campble [The certification states that Campbell was a laborer.]

[The following are among bounty warrant papers in the Library of Virginia.]

THE within CERTIFICATE shall not avail the bearer as a discharge, until the ratification of the definitive treaty of peace; previous to which time, and until proclamation thereof shall be made, he is to be considered as being on furlough.

THESE are to CERTIFY that the bearer hereof Dennis Campbell private soldier in Lt. Colo. [illegible], having fatihfully served the United States and being inlisted for he war, is hereby discharged from the American army.

Given at the war office the 21<sup>st</sup> August 1783 by order of the secretary at war [signed] B. Lincoln [illegible signature]

Dennis Campbell a private of Colo [Henry] Lee's Legion was a citizen of and credited to the State of Virginia as appears from a return of that Corps lodge in our Office [illegible initial] Randolph Auditors Office/ April 25<sup>th</sup> 1784
