Madam:

I have to advise you, that from the records of this Bureau, it appears that James Christian of Cumberland County, North Carolina, served as a private in Captain Cooke's Company, Colonel Thomas Clarke's North Carolina Regiment, War of the Revolution and was allowed pension, on account of disability incurred in the service, at the rate of \$60 per annum, from March 4, 1789. He died October the 11th, 1826.

The dates of his birth and service and nature of his disability are not of record, nor is there any data on file as to his family.

Said records also show that James Christian, Second, of Wake County, North Carolina, served as a private in the Army of the Revolution and was allowed pension on account of disability incurred in the service, at the rate of \$30 per annum, from March 4, 1789. He died March 28, 1815.

The dates of his birth and service, names of his officers and nature of his disability are not alone record, nor is there any data on file as to his family.
