Georgia Crawford County: Know all men that I William Ham of the County of Crawford in the State of Georgia do hereby declare that I enlisted in the Continental line of the Army of the Revolution for and during the war and continued in its service until its termination at which period I was a private soldier in Captain Richard Wynn's Company and Colonel Thompson's Regiment of the Continental line – And I also declare that I afterwards received a Certificate for the reward of \$80 to which I was entitled by a resolve of Congress passed on the 15th day of May 1778.

And do further declare that I was not on the 15th day of March 1828 on the pension list of the United States and I also further declare that I had a discharge which was burned up in my house which was consumed soon after the termination of the war aforesaid.

The foregoing statement and declaration sworn to and subscribed before made this 16th day of July 1828.

Knoxville Crawford County Georgia 7th February 1829

Sir

Your letter of the 20th December last has been received in answer to which [the I] will state that during the Revolutionary war I served in the gusta [sic ?] from the State of South Carolina in Captain Wynns Company, Colonel Thompson's Regiment and under General Sumpter [sic, Thomas Sumter] was at the Battles of Stono and the Eutaw Springs – and other slight skirmishes. Was taken a prisoner by the British in the State of Georgia at Fort McIntosh. The lapse of time has been such that I am not able at this period to furnish any other evidence of my service but will add that I am in a state of penury and want.

Revolutionary Claims Treasury Department, August 23, 1828

William Ham of \_\_ in the County of Crawford in the State of Georgia has applied to the Secretary of the Treasury for the benefits of the act, entitled "An act for the relief of certain surviving officers and soldiers of the Revolution," approved the 15th of May, 1828. He states that he enlisted in the Continental line of the Army of the Revolution, for and during the war, and continued until its termination, at which period he was a private in Captain R. Wynn's Company, in Colonel Thompson's regiment of the South Carolina line; and that he received a certificate for the reward of eighty dollars, provided by the resolve of the 15th of May, 1778; and further, that he was not on the 15th of May, 1828, on the pension list of the United States, and that he has received as a pensioner since the 3rd of March, 1826, nothing,

The Third Auditor is requested to report how far the several statements are corroborated by the records in his Office.
