[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

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Obtain the benefit of an act relief of certain surviving officers and soldiers of the Army of the Revolution approved on the 15th of May 1828 -- I Abraham Kearslick of the County of Clarke, in the State of Alabama, do hereby declare that, I enlisted in the Continental line of the Army of the revolution, for and during the War, and continued in its service until its termination, at which period I was a Sergeant in Captain Hall's [George A. Hall's] Company, in the 2nd South Carolina Regiment, \_\_ Line and I also declare that I afterwards received \$80 to which I was entitled under the resolve of Congress, passed the 15th day of May 1778 -- And I further declare that I was not on the 15th of Marched 1828 on the Pension List of the United States.


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State of Alabama Wilcox County: Personally appeared before me James Dewett Senior, a Justice of the peace [for the] County & State aforesaid Matthias Walker<sup>1</sup> who being duly sworn deposeth and saith that Abraham Kearslick enlisted and took the bounty from Charles Pinckney a revolutionary officer and when drawed for belonged to Captain Isaac Harleston's [sic, probably Isaac Child Harleton's] Company in the 2nd Regiment of South Carolina for six months or three years if required. This deponent does not recollect the time when said Kearslick enlisted but it was at the commencement of the revolutionary war. And this deponent further states that he saw said Kearslick after he had served the three years and said Kearslick that he had his furlough and discharge which was shown to this deponent, he also told deponent that he had enlisted during the war. This deponent never saw Kearslick again until the conclusion of the war when he again showed deponent his discharge which he had first received again the second time.

Abraham Kearslick of \_\_ in the County of Clark in the State of Alabama has applied to the Secretary of the Treasury for the benefits of the act, entitled "An act for the relief of certain surviving officers and soldiers of the Revolution," approved the 15th of May, 1828. He states that he enlisted in the Continental line of the Army of the Revolution, for and during the war, and continued until its termination, at which period he was a Sergeant in Captain Hall's Company, in the Second regiment of the S. Carolina line; and that he received a certificate for the reward of eighty dollars, provided by the resolve of the 15th of May, 1778; and further, that he was not on the 15th of May, 1828, on the pension list of the United States, and that he has received as a pensioner since the 3rd of March, 1826, nothing
