[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' or 'undeciphered' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention. Researchers should not rely solely on the transcripts but should review the originals for themselves. These transcripts are intended as an aid to research, not to be used in lieu thereof.]

State of Mississippi, Winston County

On this the 29th day of July in the year of our Lord 1844 personally appeared before me Felix Ellis Judge of Probate in and for the County of Winston, Elizabeth Gilkey a resident in the County and State aforesaid who being first duly sworn deposeth and maketh the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of an act of Congress passed on the 7th day of July A.D. 1838, entitled an act granting half pay & pensions to certain widows, that she is the widow of Samuel Gilkey who was a private in the Militia of the State of South Carolina in the war of the revolution & served in Colonel Brandon's [Thomas Brandon's] Regiment of said Militia, and was engaged in service from the fall of Charleston [May 12, 1780] to the close of the war of independence, & was present at the battles of Cowpens [January 17, 1781] & Kings Mountain [October 7, 1780] fighting in behalf of his Country. Declarant further states that she was married to the said Samuel Gilkey in the State of South Carolina in the year 1786 and has continued to reside with the said Samuel Gilkev to the time of his death as wife & consort of him the said Samuel, and, that the said Samuel departed this life on or about the month of January 1818, and declarant from that hitherto [?] hath remained and still is a widow & unmarried; and declarant further deposeth & swears that she is aged & infirm and cannot personally be present to make this the declaration in open Court and this declarant further states that she has no record evidence of her marriage to the said Samuel there being no public record of marriage or of marriage bans in the State of South Carolina and the length of time which has elapsed since the same took place renders it extremely difficult for this declarant to make proof of the same by witnesses thereto. That she has raised a large family the children of herself & the said Samuel by her said marriage.

In testimony whereof I the said Felix Ellis have hereunto set my hand & affixed my seal this the day & year above written & I do further certify that the said declarant is aged & infirm so as to be unable to make this application in open Court.

My best attempt to decipher the above:

November 11 1811 [?] I went [to] the Comptroller General's Office [and] searched for services Done in the Revolutionary War by Samuel Gilkey. Said Gilkey served in Colonel Brennan [Brandon's] Regiment and under Captain John Thomson of Union District. Said Gilkey served in the year 1780 and 'til the Close of the War. Said Gilkey was in the Battle at Kings Mountain [October 7, 1780] and also at the battle at the Cowpens [January 17, 1781]. If there is any account of his services I want to know how long he served in the war altogether as his Widow is still alive and is entitled to a pension and we can't obtain it without [sic, unless] we can find some account of his services on the record in your office. Be so good as to send me the account in writing and the bearer of this will pay you for your trouble. This from yours with respect S/ Isaac Peelar
