[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

[On March 14, 1851, in Vigo County, Indiana, Abashaba Clark, 75, filed a claim stating that she was the daughter of Caleb Glascow, late of Pasquotank County, NC: that she moved from Pasquotank to Vigo in 1845; that her father was a revolutionary soldier having entered the service at "Winfield Court house in Pasquotank; that he was at Bunker's Hill in June 1775; that he had small pox while in service; that he drove a team while convalescing; that he was discharged at Little York; that he died on old Christmas Day A. D. 1804 or 1807 in Pasquotank County; that her father never received any thing from the government, nor did his widow who died in Pasquotank in 1810; that she had one sister, Dorcas Pugh who also now lives in Indiana; that the services of her father were once proved by Jesse Wilson, a senator of the State of NC by two old soldiers, but Wilson is now dead and she doesn't know what has become of the papers he prepared to make the claim. She signed her application with her mark.]
