Pension application of Abraham Hardie (Hardee) R4597 Transcribed by Will Graves

Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of North Carolina Pitt County: This may Certify that Joseph Corey made oath before me that Isaac Hardie did serve in the Revolutionary War as a Lieutenant during the war and that Major **Abraham Hardie** is his legal heir this first day of November 1822

State of North Carolina Pitt County: Alfred Hardie maketh oath that he is the only surviving child who was a Lieutenant in Captain Burnary [?] Company in the 10th Regiment and afterwards was a Captain in the Revolutionary War as will appear by the accompanying papers. That the said Abraham Hardie is now dead and this affidavit is made for the purpose of procuring such pension and the land for the services of said Abraham in the Revolutionary War to which this affiant as his only surviving child is entitled. This affiant further states that the said Abraham Hardy in his lifetime never received any bounty land or pension for his services.


