## Pension application of Drury Banks R475 Transcribed by Will Graves

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of Georgia, Coweta County

On this the 3<sup>rd</sup> of May 1834 personally appeared before me Samuel D. Echols one of the Judges of the Inferior Court of said State & County Drury Banks, a resident of the County of Coweta & State of Georgia aged Eighty (the applicant from age and infirmity not being able to attend in open Court) who being first duly sworn according to law, doth, on his oath, make the following declaration, in order to attain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7<sup>th</sup> 1832.

That he entered the Service of the United States under the following named officers, and served as herein stated – That he entered the service as a volunteer in a troop of horse, on the first day of October 1780, his Captain's name was William Cage, and his Colonel's name was Litteral [John Luttrell], he was living in Chatham County North Carolina when he entered the service, he served out his tour of three months and returned home. In the month of December 1781 there was a draft ordered at Chatham County, to furnish (I do not now recollect the amount of man) from each company, to serve Eighteen months (I now think to serve in the Continental service) and every thirteen men, had to furnish one man or stand a draft, and it fell my lot to go. I furnished in my place (being then a married man with a family) an able-bodied man as substitute, by the name of John Thompson who entered the service (I think) in January 1782, and served out his tour, and was discharged and returned home, he received for his services one hundred & fifty pounds for his services, the name of his officers, I never knew, after entering the service he was marched on to the North, but I cannot tell anything about his services. That he has no documentary evidence, and that he knows of no person, except Jessy George whose testimony he can procure (which is hereunto annexed) who can testify to his service. He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity, except the present, and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of any of the Agency of any State.
