Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

## State of Virginia County of Orange SS

On this the 18<sup>th</sup> day of June 1842 personally appeared before me Richard Richards Jr. a Justice of the peace in and for the County aforesaid Susan Herndon a resident of said County who after being duly sworn according to law doth on her oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of an act of Congress passed July 7<sup>th</sup> 1838 for the benefit of pensioners. That she is the widow of William Herndon who died in May 1827 and to whom she was married in the County of Orange in the year 1787 by Parson Nathaniel Sanders & that the said William Herndon her husband was in the war of the Revolution and although she can say nothing of his services, she has heard him say he served seven months – that he never did receive any pension from the government and she believes he died before it was known generally that they could get pensions.

State of Virginia, Orange County to wit

On this the 15<sup>th</sup> day of April 1843 personally appeared before me Richard Richards Jr., a Justice of the peace in and for said County George Perry aged about Eighty-four years, who after being first duly sworn doth on his oath state that William Herndon of the County of Orange (now deceased) late the husband of Susan Herndon was a soldier in the War of the Revolution and served 6 months that he went to the South, the date not recollected, but thinks it was about the time of Gates' defeat [Battle of Camden, August 15-16, 1780].
