State of South Carolina District of Lancaster: SS

On this 22nd day of March 1854 personally appeared in open Court before the Court of Common Pleas & General Sessions now sitting Richmond R Terrell – a resident of the District of Lancaster – and State of South Carolina and administrator of John Hinson deceased who being first duly sworn, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the arrears of Pension due to John Hinson deceased who in his lifetime was entitled to the benefit of the provisions made by the act of Congress of June 7, 1832. That the said John Hinson enlisted as a private in Captain – the name of the Captain & Colonel of Regiment not known to the administrator and that he served during the revolutionary war – all of which is fully proved by official documents on file among the Public records of this state at Columbia South Carolina upon which a pension was granted to him by the state of South Carolina for his services in the Revolutionary War of \$60 per annum, authenticated copies¹ of said records are herewith presented to prove that he served during the Revolutionary War upwards of ___years – as a private

He also declares that the said John Hinson died in Lancaster District on the 26th day of January 1845 aged about 94 years that he left no widow surviving him, but left the following children who now survived him to it John D Hinson, Elijah Hinson, Moley wife of Riley Cator and Esther wife of Jesse Cator – That he has never heard nor does he believe that the said John Hinson was ever placed on any pension roll of the United States or ever made application for a pension from the United States & he hereby relinquishes every claim to a pension or arrears of pension except the present under any other law.
