Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8<sup>th</sup> of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

The State of Alabama Russell County: Personally appeared before me Ulysses Lewis, Judge of the County Court in & for the County of Russell State aforesaid, Moses Hinson, who being duly sworn deposeth and saith, that he enlisted and served a nine months tour in the Revolutionary war under Colonel Caswell, in the then County of Dobbs, but now Lenoir County in the State of North Carolina at a place called Kinston Court House, that he marched from the place of his enlistment under Captain John Shepherd in said Regiment to Norfolk in the State of Virginia, that after serving a part of his time at that station, he was turned over to the command of Captain William Harper, under whom he completed his nine months tour of service and received a written discharge. This deponent further states that his written discharge together with other papers were burnt and destroyed with his house a few years ago. Deponent saith that one of his neighbors (to wit) James Skipper<sup>1</sup> enlisted at the same time with him, under the same officer and served with him the whole of the nine months tour. This deponent knows of no person living by whom he can establish these facts, and would not now have applied for a Pension but for the destruction of his property a few years since by fire and his extreme old, decrepit and infirm condition, being unable to procure a support for himself and family by his own exertions.
