[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of Georgia Columbia County: For the purpose of obtaining the benefit of an act for the relief of certain Surviving officers and soldiers of the Army of the Revolution approved on the 15<sup>th</sup> day of May 1828, I, John Kent, of the Seventh District in the County of Columbia, in the State of Georgia, do hereby declare that I enlisted on the Continental line of the Army of the revolution for and during the war and continued in service until its termination at which period I was a private in Captain Parsons company in the Second Regiment of the Virginia line. And I also declare that I afterwards received a certificate for the reward of eighty dollars to which I was entitled under a resolve of Congress passed the 15<sup>th</sup> of May 1778. And I do further declare, that I was not on the 15<sup>th</sup> day of March 1828, on the pension list of the United States. And I also further declare that I was engaged in and fought in the following Battles viz., Bunkers Hill [bunker Hill, June 17, 1775] and received a wound in the left hip by a musket ball, Rhode Island [August 29, 1778], Brandywine [September 11, 1777] Monmouth [June 28, 1778], Jerman Town [Germantown, October 4, 1777], Schuylkill and received another wound with a buckshot in the right hip, which shot still remains in the hip, Guilford Court House [March 15, 1781], Camden [probably the battle of Hobkirk Hill, April 25, 1781], Eutaw Springs [September 8, 1781] at which place my left leg was broken in many pieces by a canister shot, and frequently since the leg heats up, pieces of bone has come out, and one last spring and I do further declare that I was eighty years old the first instant, and in very indigent circumstances, and has a large family to support which I am not able to do from manual labor. And further declare that my discharges and certificate for the reward of eighty dollars to which I was entitled under a resolve of Congress passed the 15<sup>th</sup> of May 1778 were destroyed by fire burning my Master's house about twenty years after the close of the revolutionary war.

[p 6: On September 13, 1855 in Columbia County Georgia, Susan Kent, 95, filed for a widow's pension under the 1848 and other acts stating that she is the widow of John Kent who she believes was a soldier in the revolution holding the office of Drum Major; that she believes he entered the service in the state of North Carolina sometime in 1776 and was discharged in 1783; that he served under General Andrew Pickens; that he fought at the battles of Augusta, Kettle Creek, and at Blackstocks; that her husband applied for a pension but for some informality in his papers, he was not placed on the pension list; that she married him the last day of February 1792 and that he died February 14, 1846; and that she remains his widow. She signed her application

with her mark.]

[p 17: On November 12, 1855 in Columbia County Georgia, John Arrington, 90, gave testimony that he knew John Kent the husband of Susan Kent; that he knows that John Kent was a soldier and drummer in the Revolution in the state of South Carolina and was at the siege of Augusta in 1781, at Briar Creek, at Charleston, Stono and other places; that Kent was a good drummer and honest man and died poor. The affiant signed his affidavit with his mark.]
