## Pension application of William Kercheval R5882 Transcribed by Will Graves

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

## Declaration

Of William Kercheval in order to obtain a pension under the provision of the Act of Congress of 7<sup>th</sup> of June 1832, this declarant saith that he was born in Orange County in the State of Virginia on the 15<sup>th</sup> day of August 1748, that he derived the information of the date of his birth from his father's register which he kept in a book which he frequently saw, At thirteen years of age he removed to that part of Augusta County which is now included in Frederick County, and there continued during the revolution War; That during the War and after the capture [of] Burgoyne at Saratoga [Bemis Heights, October 7, 1777], and the removal of the British prisoners from Winchester to Charlottesville he was drafted as a militia man for a three months tour to guard said prisoners at Charlottes [sic, Charlottesville]; that he went to that place & served out his three months tour; Colonel Phebisher [presumably a mistaken attempt to identify Christian Febiger] was the commanding Officer at that place during the time of his Service. He was a second time drafted for a tour of three months for the same service and went & performed his three months of service & was discharged he does not recollect at this remote period whether he received a written discharge for either of his tours of duty if he did however they are lost or mislaid. He will mention that while he was at Charlottesville in discharge of his duty on he thinks the last tour, they were visited by Colonel Tarlton [Banastre Tarleton] & his Corps of British Dragoons. After the revolutionary War he removed to the West that he is now a Citizen resident in Logan County in the State of Kentucky & has been for the space of 26 years last past.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present, and declares that his name is not on the pension Roll of any State.

Sworn to & subscribed before John H Marshall Esquire a Justice of the Peace in and for the County & state aforesaid this  $6^{th}$  day of December 1836
